Structure of Prayer Service

1. Introductory Rite

- Commence with song embedded in Powerpoint or click the following: "Blest be the Lord"
- Welcome and Introduction:

Leader (Chaplain): Good afternoon and welcome to our end of year staff celebration of our collective dedicated efforts to develop a safe, caring, Catholic culture for our school community. As the end of the school year approaches, it is nice to reflect on how we have positively impacted our students, staff, and our community. The end of the year also offers an opportune time to reflect and personally assess our growth on the goals we set out for ourselves at the commencement of the school year. It also offers a time to look at areas of personal need so we may be able to continue to develop professionally to collectively contribute to the building and maturation of our institution which serves students, parents, staff, and the community. I now invite you to sign ourselves by making the sign of the cross through which all things have been made new: "In the name of the Father, and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen."

• Clear Invocation

Lord God, as we ponder the blessings and challenges of this past year, grant us the serenity of your Spirit and openness of heart to the wonders you have done in us and will continue to do in faithfulness to us, your children. We make this prayer to you through Christ our Lord. Amen. (Consentino, 2009)

2. Scripture (Reading by Staff Member A)

NRSV: Romans 12:6-8

A reading from the letter of St. Paul to the Romans.

7. Closing Music: On Eagles Wings. Song embedded in Powerpoint. Also click the following <u>"On Eagle's Wings"</u>.

General Considerations:

1. Were participants appropriately engaged?

I anticipate opportunity for engagement to be shared during the prayer service through the following:

- a) songs selected were vocally easy to sing, staff is familiar with the song, words were displayed via projector
- b) holding hands during the Lord's prayer, although a small gesture, it demonstrates togetherness, accepting, belonging. In the year of the family for our school board it is an especially nice gesture to demonstrate solidarity
- c) Prayer of the Faithful provides members of the church community to personally connect to prayer.
- d) Selected readings and responses are projected for everyone to follow
- e) Symbolic lighting of candles during prayers of the faithful increases number of active participants in the prayer services (candle is lit as each prayer of the faithful is read)

2. Did the order of service provide just what was essential to engage the participant?

It is my feeling that the prayer service went beyond the essential to engage the participants. Words of familiar church songs were projected so staff could participate in the singing of the opening and closing songs. Additionally staff were invited to light candles during the prayers of the faithful as well as hold hands during the reciting of Our Father.

3. Was a complete presider's version made available?

Yes, a brochure and power point was made to aide the presider and the staff in celebrating the prayer service.

4. Could my colleagues be able to duplicate this prayer service with what they have been given?

Yes, a colleague would be able to duplicate this prayer service with this document, in addition to the power point file and the brochure.

5. Was the language: inclusive and age appropriate?

Yes, I feel the language was inclusive and age appropriate for a Catholic Secondary School staff.

6. What understanding of the Paschal Mystery was conveyed?

The passion of Jesus' teaching on earth, his death and resurrection have been addressed trough the selected reading, prayer for the faithful and in the opening and closing rites.

7. Additional Comments:

This prayer service with all associated mp3, ppt, pdf files, has been placed in the teacher's public community folder on our school hard drive. It can be used and modified to best fit our community's needs.
